

- 3) Put some sweets or raisins on 4 cocktail sticks and push the ends into the orange in 4 different places these represent all the amazing gifts that God has given.

I remember we went on the carol tour around the village, and there was a highly enthusiastic man who seemed to embody the spirit of Christmas [I'm under the impression she's talking about Danny], we went to Crown Road and after a loud countdown, with children's voices rising above the swell of excitement, the dark street burst into light. It seemed to me a kaleidoscope of colour, and I'm not sure I've ever felt more at home then when random people came up excitedly wishing us a happy Christmas and asking me what I was doing for Christmas...Nothing will beat that night, with the cold air, wrapped in a Christmas jumper.'—

RISK OF FLOODING

Whilst I have no wish to further burden you all, I think we all feel that being prepared is much more comfortable than being unsure what to do. To that end, and inspired by a refresher Flood Warden online session, it seemed a good idea to send out some reminders.

Do you live within the 1/100-year risk of flooding zone?

The Parish Council sent out letters a couple of years ago to all residents whose dwellings were in this area. Houses change hands and you may be unsure. I am able to check that for you if you wish.

If you do, have you signed up to receive Alerts and Warnings from the Environment Agency?

If you do, have you made a personal flood plan? This is basically a check list of things you need to do or have to hand should you have to evacuate your house. (Turn off electricity, water and heating fuels, have insurance documents and medication needs at the ready, set up flood barriers, pan seals for ground floor toilets etc.). A template will be available on the parish council website, but I can always provide a paper copy.

Again, some two years ago we had an event in the village hall for residents to see the protective devices that they could install in their homes. The company that provided this kindly left me samples to show you.

<u>https://www.riverlevels.uk</u>: levels of the Darent at Otford is a useful site to watch. The highest recorded level in 2014 did result in a very few properties in Shoreham experiencing flooding.

If you wish to discuss any of these matters and the support you can expect, please make contact with me via the Parish Clerk.

What we can all do:

Keeping the rivers running freely is really important and as we are all tending to walk about our lovely village more, we can keep our eyes open. Any debris in the river must be reported to the Environment Agency and of course it is an offence to put anything in the river, including vegetation. SDC have kept to the schedule of cleaning gullies but of course this cannot be done beneath or close to parked cars; it's a problem here because many residents don't have off road parking. Being a good citizen and cleaning those gullies that could not be reached would be most helpful: either personally or by asking for help. Walkers may notice blocked drains and again these should be reported to Kent Highways using their 'Report a Fault' tool, which can be found at

DECEMBER NEWS FROM THE VILLAGE SCHOOL

November has brought some lovely community events for our school. We received a 'thank you' from Councillor Christabel Flight for our engagement with the Silver Sunday project – an initiative where pupils wrote cards to senior members of the Sevenoaks community which were distributed on Silver Sunday along with a care package and online exercise classes.

Pupils have also spent time this week preparing written Christmas messages to the Shoreham Over-60's Club; we usually visit them during their Christmas lunch to sing for them but as this event will not take place this year, we hope to engage with them in a different way to show them we are still thinking about them and sending them Christmas joy.

We have been pleased to receive a special personalised video message from local MP, Laura Trott, to kick off our UK Parliament Week activities. Cameron Class had the opportunity to discuss issues that they felt passionately about and they then created campaign videos to persuade others in the school to support their causes. These campaigns included: free pet health care, traffic lights on Filston Lane, pet licences for pet owners, a reduction in deforestation in the Amazon rainforests, a reduction in the speed limit in built up areas to 20 mph between 10pm and 6am, and a reduction in air pollution. All pupil watched the videos and voted for a campaign and the winners were: Animal Respect Party who want animal owners to earn licences and be accountable for the way they treat their pets.

Generations of children in Shoreham have enjoyed the very special experience of Santa making an annual visit to the village at 5.15 on Christmas Eve. We have always been grateful to him that he has found time from his busy schedule to fly in for a special half hour for us. This magical tradition began in the late 50s when Jill and Tom Morgan at Record in Church St managed to secure an open ended contract with Santa to visit the village with an early small gift for Shoreham children. The Morgans thought that a little get together for Shoreham families before the crib service (later the Christingle service) at 6pm, with Santa as star guest could be enjoyed by all ages.

The Morgans hospitality was legendary and every year a few parents didn't quite make it to church such was the lure of Tom's mulled wine! For the children, the experience was, and remains, magical. Santa arrives about 5.15 and, surrounded by star struck faces, he draws gifts from his sack, each one clearly marked with a child waiting in the room. The secret formula for this, involving secreting bags from the parents as they arrive, which are then taken to the back of the house by kind volunteers, has never failed.

The tradition continued in 2002 when Jon and Maria Beard became the new occupants of Record. When they moved overseas a few years later, The Shoreham Society secured a venue at 2 Shoreham House. Santa managed the change of address with ease and happy children continued to enjoy his visits.

Shoreham Society members provided Santa with support as numbers of families attending had reached new heights. Elves manage the challenging task of collecting the necessary contributions for the sack and providing refreshments. Songs and carols are sung whilst we wait for the sound of Santa's bell. Recently, the George has been the venue and whilst this was a technical challenge due to the huge numbers attending, the essential magic of this tradition continues. Many of us have now seen three generations enjoy this special Shoreham Santa visit on Christmas Eve at 5.15.

2020 will be the first time Santa has not been able to make his traditional visit but he has been in negotiation with the Shoreham Society and many kind residents so there is every chance that Shoreham children will get at least one opportunity to see him for a socially distanced chat this year.

JEAN LOTHIAN

Jean was born in Portsmouth in 1925 and died age 94 on 1st July. After school she joined the WRNS, working in codes and ciphers in the final years of the war. She very much enjoyed her time in the Navy, particularly her voyages to and from Australia. She met a young Surgeon Lieutenant in Chatham, Bill Lothian and they married in 1949. After a few months in Dundee, they moved to Shoreham. And so, began the Lothians' long association with the village. First living at t Record in Church Street before moving to Winslade Cottage and finally moving to Orchard House in 1966.

Although Bill was an extremely dedicated family doctor, he always wanted to be involved in village activities. For many years he was Chairman of Shoreham Horticultural & Cottage Gardeners' Society & he was the first Chairman of the Shoreham & District Historical Society and a Church Warden. Not to be outdone, besides bringing up three children, Andy, Sarah and Alex, Jean too played a full part in village life. She was on the Parish Council, which she chaired for many years and she also chaired the Governors of Shoreham Village School. Like Bill, she regularly attended the village church where her skills as a flower-arranger were often on display. She was a great supporter of local shops and hardly ever set foot in a supermarket.

They made many true friends in the village, with many of whom the family are still in touch. But at the heart of her life, however, were her family and her dogs whom she adored so much. She loved following the lives of her 8 grandchildren and her 2 great grandchildren. She is missed enormously by everybody. Without doubt the happiest years of her life were the 50 she and Bill spent together in their beloved Shoreham. Sarah White

BEANS AND BONFIRES

In the late 1930s my father started growing runner beans on a field scale. The field he used was Crown Meadow, the five-acre field at the top of Crown Road. Runner beans can be grown for many years on the same piece of land. The land was first given a good dressing of farmyard manure and waste products bought from a merchant in Otford. Things like shoddy (wool waste) and fish heads or tannery waste were very good for the soil. Once the field was cultivated ready for the beans it was marked out with rows about 6ft apart which were wide enough for the small tractor to cultivate the beans. Poles 7ft6 tall were driven in 7ft apart and then three horizontal rows of coir yarn (hop string) were fixed to the poles and then vertical strings were fixed about 9" apart: one for each bean plant. When all danger of frost was passed (and later than the local gardeners) the beans were planted by the local ladies with a dibber; one lady worked each acre with help from the other farm staff.

The beans were picked by the ladies and packed into bushel (40 lbs) boxes by Harry, an 80-year-old worker, who lived in Crown Road. They were taken to Borough wholesale market very early the next morning to be sold to the retail shops that day. There were of course no domestic freezers in those days and not many imports but as time went on the freezers and imports increased and the fresh bean trade died.

When the frosts came, usually in the last week of October, the bean haulm was cut down and soon dried. We teenagers made heaps of these for bonfire night. One year they were still picking a few beans late into the month and much to our disappointment we had nothing to burn for bonfire night. The bonfire was the central focus of 5th November for several years because, of course, there were very few fireworks available as they were not made during the war!

TALES FROM THE HILL

I recently heard a farmer, James Rebanks, on BBC Radio 4 explaining how in the last 60 years farmers have been speeding down a cul-de-sac. Cutthroat competition between supermarkets has reached a point where innovation in terms of farming practices, not just the use of chemicals but cultivation and animal husbandry, has reached a tipping point. Perhaps you may think this is old news, well it is, but the difference is that Rebanks is proposing a practical solution.

The warning signs came early for him, Rebanks remembers his father saying. "James there is something seriously wrong I have just ploughed a field and there were no gulls or crows following behind, there are no worms." The drive to increase the production of cheap food is not just down to the supermarkets, but also government farming bureaucracy. What farmer can resist "a giant bit of kit" that can do the job in half the time – but those pieces of kit do not come free.

Most farmers live with gigantic overdrafts, often an inherited debt. Banks have been only too happy to lend for land which has been used as safe collateral, meanwhile soil is getting poorer and often serves only to anchor the crop to the ground.

So as farm gate prices are driven down the only alternative left to farmers is to increase production by using more fertilizer and more intensive production methods. It is not

unusual for a field of wheat to be sprayed 7 or 8 times from sowing to harvest.

Rebanks does not wish to demonize farmers, the task of making that break to improve fertility and at the same time create better conditions for wildlife is certainly daunting. Rebanks' message is for groups of farmers say 10 or 20 to work together. The ambition is getting the farming industry 'okay' for the next generation: improve the varieties in grass swards, return to hay instead of silage, bring back crops that we now import – not long ago Sainsburys were selling out of season Sweet Corn flown in from Thailand! Last year only 5 pairs of curlews bred in Southern England a bird whose plaintive call reflects its present predicament. Happy Christmas to you all
