**Summer Camps ~ Shoreham ~ Salisbury**

My title this month, is a bit like in the Round Britain Quiz on Radio 4, where the contestants are challenged to find the link between a number of seemingly disparate things. I hope, my connections are a bit easier to follow, although you'll have to be the judge of that.

Starting with Summer Camps. I was interested to read in a recent newspaper article, that Carey Mulligan and her (now) husband Marcus Mumford (of Mumford & Sons), met on a Christian camp when they were 12.

There are a whole range of fantastic summer camps for different ages (usually age groups 8+, 11+, 15+), run by Christian organisations such as Scripture Union ([SU scriptureunion.org.uk](http://scriptureunion.org.uk)) and CPAS (Venture holidays [www.ventures.org.uk/ventures](http://www.ventures.org.uk/ventures)).

All the holidays share the core values of fun, friendship and faith exploration. You can choose from multi-activity residentials with a mix of sport, adventure, arts and crafts, fun and games, or go for one of the specialist holidays which focus on a specific activity ... sailing, technology, outdoor activities, baking, cycling, creative, karting and even skiing ... the accommodation ranges from camping in tents to sleeping in log cabins, and from outdoor activity centres to luxury boarding schools.

On the websites you will also find information about holidays for young adults with additional learning needs (SU) and children and young people who may face disadvantage or difficult circumstances in their daily lives (CPAS - Falcon holidays).

Next Salisbury. As many of you will know, Alain, Joe and I will sadly be leaving super, special, stunning Shoreham, this time next year, moving to Wiltshire, where we have a house which is in Salisbury Diocese (to keep with the 'S' theme). By then, I will have been Vicar of Shoreham for 9 and a half years. At this stage, I am not moving on to anything specific but, following the example of so many wonderful people in this village, at 64 I hope to be involved in some kind of ministry for a number more years yet.

Maybe now you can see the connection in the three elements in the title? My family didn't go to church. In my mid to late teens, I went on a few summer camps. ## SHOREHAM VILLAGE PLAYERS – David Nash

David, who recently died just before his 94<sup>th</sup> birthday, made his first appearance on the Shoreham stage in 1971 in *Roar like a Dove* and never looked back. Perhaps his most demanding and sympathetic part was as Tin Man in *The Wizard of Oz*, but he was also stalwart as the Red King in *Alice*, Colonel Pickering in *Pygmalion*, Mr Bumble and Mr Brownlow in different productions of *Oliver*, Mr Darling in *Peter Pan* and many more, including a more unexpected casting, with Liz, as Mr and Mrs Barn Owl in *Robin Hood*.

David's chief characteristics were his charm, his old-fashioned politeness, and his consideration for others; but as far as the Players were concerned they were his delightful tenor voice and his spontaneous laugh. Katie Kingshill saw to it that every pantomime had a good part for David, for which Danny would compose suitable songs. And when David was not appearing in a play we used to say we'd pay him to be in the audience because of his vocal enthusiasm and wonderful, infectious laugh. We are very lucky to have known him.

(I can't resist a personal anecdote: in my first major production for the Players, *Toad of Toad Hall* in 1979, David played the Judge in Toad's trial. Sitting at the Judge's bench he found it easy to smuggle in his script, which he never actually learnt, much to the resentment of the assorted ferrets, stoats, weasels and field mice whom Jean Hicks was harrying to learn their words! ## **100 YEARS OF SHOREHAM VILLAGE HALL**

This year marks a century since the opening of Shoreham's much-loved Village Hall, and a new pamphlet from the Historical Society chronicles the many ups and downs of the Hall over that time. The building was opened on Saturday 24th May 1924 after years of struggle to find the several thousand pounds of funding for it. It was originally intended to be a "memorial hall" to honour the dead of the First World War, with their names marked on an archway at the front, but the building of the Cross on the Hill and the inscription stone by the bridge took away this particular identity.

At the grand opening, there was a welcome party made up of scouts, guides and cubs to usher in the guest of honour – Lord Mildmay, who had donated land for the "handsome brick building of generous proportions", as the *Sevenoaks Chronicle* called it. He and his wife took their place, along with other notables such as Lady Louisa Cohen and Lord Dunsany, on a platform which seems to have been decorated with spring flowers. "The hall could not hold all who wished to cram themselves within its walls," said the local paper. The village brass band had to make do with a position outside.

In a speech, Mildmay talked of the "inestimable boon" the Hall would represent, supplying a "very long-felt want". It would provide a "uniting link" between all the groups and social classes of the village, and help as a "humanising influence". What he called a "spirit of generous optimism" had somewhat disappeared in the war and he hoped that this could now be revived. To applause, he then declared the hall open.

The well-known local writer, Lord Dunsany, also spoke, noting how Lord Mildmay had made “a considerable subscription” to get the Hall off the ground. The new building had a “dignity and quiet beauty” and would be “a source of enjoyment for countless years to come”. Further tributes came from Benjamin Greenwood, the wealthy local builder who had been fighting for six years to see the project to fruition. The ceremony ended with the brass band striking up “God Save the King” from their station outside the windows

### **NEWS FROM SHOREHAM VILLAGE SCHOOL**

Each term, we focus on one of our school values, relating that value to a book that we read together in assembly. In term 1 we used the book, 'The Bad Seed' to think about 'Responsibility' and in term 2 we read 'Not a Box' to highlight the importance of 'Curiosity'. In term 3, we reflected on 'Determination' after reading the book, 'The Rainbow Fish', a much loved book about a fish who shows determination to change their ways. This term, we are thinking about our school value, 'Respect' through the book, 'In Every House on Every Street'. Our school values (which also include Kindness and Courage), are the characteristics we expect everyone in our whole school community to develop and display, and we are proud to say that these are strongly embedded in our school.

We are pleased to have been selected to participate in the Wilder Kent Awards with the Kent Wildlife Trust (KWT). The children in Eco Club attended a workshop, where the targets that they thought were important were established. Our coordinator from KWT then held an engaging whole school assembly to explain about the work of the trust - with a focus on our local wild animals. Pledging to take part in protecting wildlife and supporting the climate is dear to the heart of our school and the children impressed our coordinator with their enthusiasm.

Our school is participating the Kent Inclusion Leadership Project and one of our actions is to explicitly teach study skills to our pupils. Pupils who develop good study skills have higher self-esteem, are more confident, have improved academic achievement and better attitudes to lifelong learning. We need to build pupils' characters so that they achieve intrinsic rewards of success when they show motivation, independence and initiative, through modelling and celebrating these at every opportunity; this is something that can be done at home with children of all ages!

Barton Class have benefitted from welcoming lots of visitors over the past few weeks, and we would be delighted to hear from any local people who would be happy to come into school to talk about their job/career to inspire our children and help them to develop aspirational thinking about their future choices. Equally, it would be wonderful to include those who have specific faiths or who are from different cultures, who would be happy to come in and share learning on their experiences. ### **REMEMBERING.**

This month we remember two Shoreham lads on The War Memorial. Henry Blake from WW1 and Edwin Bowen from WW2.

Henry Blake was born in Shoreham in 1892. His father was Sidney....but I have no knowledge as to who his mother was. He was confirmed at Shoreham Church. He joined The East Surrey Regiment 4<sup>th</sup> Battalion and served with The West Kent Yeomanry in France. He married Daisy Sarah Luck at Mayfield E, Sussex in Oct 1918. He died in an isolation hospital in Felixstowe on 14<sup>th</sup> March and is buried at St Dunstan's churchyard Mayfield. When our War Memorial was erected and names were being inscribed....it was decided to include Henry Blake because WW1 didn't, officially, end until the treaty was signed in 1919, the year Henry died. It was thought that his death was brought on by wounds he received in France.

Edwin Bowen was born in 1923 at Halstead to Charles and Janet. By 1939 the family had moved to Shoreham living at 3 Bowers Road. He enlisted in The Royal Air Force

and was a Tail Gunner in Bomber Command. He was lost over the Baltic Sea after a mission to Berlin on 30<sup>th</sup> March 1943. His body was never recovered. He is remembered on The RAF Memorial at Runnymede Surrey.

Our February meeting welcomed Rod LeGear, who gave a very entertaining talk on the history of Chislehurst Caves. Despite old myths that they date from prehistoric times, and were once the site of Druid sacrifices, the Caves in fact date from the early 18th century. They were dug for chalk, used for fertiliser and to make products like lime mortar. Explosives were stored there in the First War and thousands of people took shelter in them in the Second. From the 1960s, jazz and pop acts made appearances, including Jimi Hendrix and the Rolling Stones.

The latest Society pamphlet was launched at the February meeting, celebrating Shoreham Village Hall across 100 years, a very interesting read.

For the **March 15th** meeting Stuart Bligh will talk about Kent & Trafalgar, the talk will follow a brief AGM.
