

FROM CROSS TO CROWN

My article this month is going to end at the coronation of Charles III but it begins with Elliot, the donkey, who, on Palm Sunday, reminds us of another very different king, as he rode into Jerusalem. The contrast of that articulated so well in this song:

Meekness and Majesty, manhood and deity

in perfect harmony - the man who is God:

Lord of eternity dwells in humanity,

kneels in humility and washes our feet.

Then ... just a few little bits about coronations, with more next month. Did you know: The sermon for Queen Victoria's Coronation Service on 28th June 1838, when she was just 19, was preached from the pulpit in Shoreham Church ... although it was located in Westminster Abbey at the time! Her coronation service lasted for 5 hours and suffered, 'from a lack of preparation'. Queen Elizabeth II's coronation, on 2nd June 1953, only lasted 3 hours. We look forward to seeing what Saturday 6th May holds.

2nd April Palm Sunday 8.45am - meet outside SVS and process to church for Breakfast@Church, which starts at 9am with breakfast (bacon rolls, croissants, hot and cold drinks) ... then a short service with an activity, reading, prayer and song.

6th April Maundy Thursday 6pm - a short reflective service

7th April Good Friday 10am - (hopefully) outside - journey through Holy Week with some readings, activities and songs - then inside to make an Easter Tree, other activities and Hot Cross buns. For all ages.

9th April Easter Sunday 10am - Festival Communion with the choir ... but before then, if you're feeling brave (or wake up early) ...

6am meet outside the Aircraft Museum to walk to the Cross. Greet Easter Day with a short sunrise service at 6.18am (and some chocolate Easter eggs) - breakfast in the Church Room afterwards.



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TALES FROM THE HILL

I am afraid that I feel compelled to return to the subject of ash dieback in Magpie Bottom, where large numbers of ash trees have been cut down under the auspices of Kent Wildlife Trust.

As I mentioned in my February Tale KWT say they are obliged to fell trees that might cause a danger to the public.

Those who have seen the devastation, not only to the woodland, but also the damage to the soil structure that supports many rare orchids and chalk loving plants, have expressed their surprise and horror at what they have seen.

Does this mean that every organization, public body, highway authority and farmer will have to fell ash trees that border a road or footpath?

The actual advice from DEFRA and Highway Authority is woolly. "They will do everything possible to preserve the biodiversity of our soft estate." [meaning the road verges and specific areas of land under the control of The Highway Authority]. In reality they realize that to fell all trees that have, or might have, ash dieback is an impossible task .It is my belief that bodies like KWT have jumped the gun and failed to consult with concerned bodies, such as Parish Councils.

NEWS FROM SHOREHAM VILLAGE SCHOOL, APRIL 2023

Our World Book Day celebrations and annual Eisteddfod Festival happened at the beginning of March. We were able to parade our World Book Day costumes alongside the Pre-school which was great fun and a lovely way to connect with our future pupils. Throughout the day, various book related activities took place in school and we finished off by watching the performances of our Class Champions, chosen by each class to represent them at the Eisteddfod. Pupils throughout the school had prepared their talents to show and we were very impressed with the range of performances, which included card tricks, roller skating, sharing art work and books that had been written and illustrated by pupils. DARENT VALLEY LANDSCAPE PARTNERSHIP SCHEME

The DVLPS Team has been busy over the past few months delivering projects that have benefitted from European funding, the end of which occurs 31/3/2023. These projects include the resurfacing of the path through the lavender fields at Castle Farm and the creation of a new path from Shoreham Station, soon to be finished off by the installation of new gates to the churchyard. We have also been working on a suite of seventeen 'Rail Trails' – walks from various stations around the valley – several of which start and/or finish at Shoreham. The leaflets will soon be printed and available at a variety of locations but they will also be available digitally both on our website and on the Darent Valley Trail app.

Conservation work on the restoration of the early 18th century Grade II listed Ice House and Queen Anne Bathhouse at Lullingstone Castle is now complete with just a couple of interpretation panels left to be installed and we are also funding some of the restoration work at the Archbishops Palace at Otford, where May Day celebrations will see the reintroduction of maypole dancing for the first time in 70 years.

And last but by no means least, we have some exciting events planned for the coming Spring/Summer starting with a Half a String's 'Breathe' puppet show at the Village Hall on April 22^{nd} . The show tells the story of a journey through the forest from the perspective of an acorn and is underscored by a blend of drum and base and ethereal folk songs. It is suitable for ages 5 - 100 and costs just £2 per child (adults go free). SHOREHAM SOCIETY

The Shoreham Shine village clean-up was a great success - as evidenced by the fine row of black bags decorating the wall outside the Village Hall afterwards!

One of the shiny jobs took us to the woods above the village, to collect old plastic tree guards. These are a relic of the tree planting that was done in the years following the great storm of 1987 - and a great amount of plastic remains. We were in the area above the eastern lower terrace, and this revealed some sad sights: dead and dying ash trees, including many that were planted in tree guards. The cause is Ash dieback fungus (see the Woodland Trust website for an explanation). This is also why you'll see cut timber beside the path, as trees have to be felled in case they fall on people. On the positive side, other trees are doing well. Yew trees are really strong and clearly thrive on our hills – bursting out of their old tree guards. Young beech trees are also doing well, and nature will undoubtedly recover in time. Incidentally, you may have been concerned about the felling of some beech trees in the area above the Cross. This is being done to open up the beech plantations to allow the trees to spread their branches and to allow more light into the woodland floor for the benefit of the wild flowers.

We'll be back out on the streets and in the woods again in the Autumn, so do join us then. In the meantime, thanks to all those who go out litter picking on their own in the lanes around the village.

All of you with (and without) children will be looking forward to the Duck Race, which is on Sunday 14th May. Proceeds will go to the Darent River Preservation Society (DRiPS) and the School. It is never too early to start designing your own unique duck. Remember that most of the awards are for style, so the more inventive the better. Running the Duck Race and controlling the crowds is a big job - please get in touch if you can help. We need duck registrars, duck launchers, duck catchers, duck runners, duck sellers – to name but a few! (christineeuman@yahoo.co.uk).

THE WALNUT TREE TRUST

A charitable incorporated organisation registered charity No 1182220

To Our Shoreham Community:

The Board of the Walnut Tree Trust at its meeting on 21 February took the decision to borrow sufficient money to accelerate its programme to restore all of its property to a fully useable condition. The cottages have already been repaired sufficiently now to comply with the "decent homes" legal standard, but the next challenge is the repair of the two remaining outbuildings that have suffered from decades of deferred maintenance.

Options for securing a loan will be explored with our bank and also with private individuals in the village who may be willing to loan money at a modest rate of interest. A few of the trustees have offered to loan some money to the Trust already and we wish to invite any other members of our community who might be interested to participate to contact us. This would be a loan, not a donation, on which interest would be paid. If you might be interested, please contact our clerk for further information: sue.worsfold@hotmail.com.

Later this year, we expect to be able to offer both the garage on the high street and the barn to rent for use as storage or perhaps a workshop. If you might be interested in renting one of these properties, please also get in touch.

At its meeting in February, the Board of the Walnut Tree Trust approved the following vision statement that we would like to share:

Always respecting the objectives of its 1932 trust deed, the Trust should become a significant provider of funding "for the general benefit of the inhabitants of Shoreham", its societies, amenities and deserving individuals.

The Trust will endeavour to achieve a stewardship that embodies the best management of the Trust's assets, "to preserve the picturesque buildings and site", "from time to time to permit the said premises or any part thereof to be used for social purposes" and "to utilise any rents, profits and income for charitable purposes". The Trust intends to maximise its funding goals while undertaking continued improvements of those assets to ensure their long-term maintenance as historically important buildings and grounds at the heart of the Village.

The Trustees should strive to put in place a robust financial and management structure that will ensure the successful continuity and sustainability of the Trust objectives for the benefit of Shoreham Village.

We wish to be open and clear with our community, and perhaps the above vision may be a surprise to some since past boards had interpreted its purpose as allowing renting the cottages at extremely low rents to deserving individuals with connections to the village. Unfortunately this resulted in a lack of maintenance and this purpose is not in our 1932 trust deed which, as we have been advised by the Charity Commission, remains in force notwithstanding our new Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) status and constitution. The current board is looking to restore the properties physically and to make them profitable for charitable purposes for the village in the future.

THE RIVER DARENT – DEMISE DURING MY LIFE TIME {Part 2}

The loss of the watercress beds were of great personal sadness to me. Those of Harry Simmons at South Darent and Fred Ward at Sutton at Hone. Laurie Vann at Sutton battled on by converting his beds into a nursery. The Devon Mill Stream, Burtenshaw Brook and Cran Brook dried up and have disappeared.

It all came to a head in 1976 when the Darent itself dried up. In the years following 1976 flows in the river remained at critical levels with isolated areas drying up. The only positive thing during this time was that the plight of the Darent was beginning to get the attention of both the local and national media. However it was not until 1985 that the Darent River Preservation Society (DRIPS) was formed with the sole intention of stopping and hopefully reversing the decline

DRIP led by its charismatic chairman Derek Attwood (of Old Cottage) assisted by the influential Hydrologist Michael Mansell-Moulin immediately begun an intensive campaign of lobbying politicians, NRA/EA, water companies, the media and anyone who would listen. This lobbying proved successful as in 1992 the NRA/EA commissioned Mott McDoanld to carry out a comprehensive study of the river and to publish their findings in a report. It was that report which led directly to the Darent Action Plan. Details of which can be found on the DRIPS website. <u>http://www.darent-drips.org.uk</u> [To be continued]
