SMALL THINGS

After a 5-year gap, Alain and I recently returned from France, where we completed the 3rd stage of our 1000-mile pilgrimage from Le Puy-en-Velay to Santiago de Compostela in Spain.

In a world bustling with noise and busyness, there is something about the physical act of pausing, of walking in nature, which slows us down, enables us to leave behind the distractions of daily life (or at least, some of them) and is a gentle reminder that small things often possess extraordinary importance.

Seemingly insignificant things can make a huge difference to how we feel, good and bad. There is something about the rhythm of walking, which helps us to notice, to be aware; so that, in some peculiar way, even the challenging things, that we 'hold in our hearts', or the smaller things, like the discomfort of a blister (a good example of how a little thing can become significant!), can become places where we discover hidden blessings and lessons that may otherwise go unnoticed.

Small things often possess beauty that we can easily overlook. The patterns on a butterfly's wing, the petals of a flower, the colours of a dragonfly, or the shape of a leaf - evoke wonder and bring joy, so too small acts of kindness and gestures of love can have a profound impact. A reassuring smile, an encouraging comment, a helping hand to a stranger, a glass of cold water at the end of a long hot walk, even a timely blister plaster or a few minutes of cloud cover ... can bring healing, gratitude and restore hope.

In a tiny seed there is the potential to grow into a tree, providing shade, sustenance, and oxygen. Similarly, a small act of kindness can make a big difference in someone's life, sparking a chain of positivity. Likewise, small acts of faith. A tiny mustard seed, carries the potential for profound growth. In our spiritual journeys, it is often the small acts of prayer, and contemplation that foster deep connections with God. These seemingly insignificant gestures become the foundation upon which we build our spiritual lives, helping us weather storms, find purpose, and experience divine love and guidance.

Small things possess the ability to nurture, inspire, and transform. By appreciating the beauty and significance of the small, we open our hearts to a world filled with possibility and discover the profound impact we too can make, one small act at a time



36TH SHOREHAM DUCK RACE REPORT - 2023

Sunshine bathed Shoreham on Sunday 14th May as hundreds of ducks flocked together on the waters of the River Darent. All shapes and sizes of bird paddled for position whilst restrained by the weir boards at the start. An impressive range of home-crafted ducks lovingly hatched in garden sheds and feathered on kitchen tables were entered. It is always a challenge to judge the BEST DRESSED DUCKS, but eight were honoured with medals and certificates.

A growing throng of duck watchers were entertained by the Quack Jockey, spinning bad yokes and foul puns until the countdown occurred and the race began. Recent rains ensured strong water currents and a sprint start with much hustle and jostle past the flowering beds of ranunculus buttercup. The front runners pushed on into the unusually fast flowing river, passing lines of children egging on their ducks. Some birds proved unfit for the rigours of the race and crept off into the reeds, awaiting help from the Duckmaster and assistants for rescue.

The leaders did not slacken their pace, resulting in the fastest race time since records began. The Quatcher team were on hand to fish out ducks, conveying exhausted contestants to a tarpaulin, ready to be reunited with their trainers. Uncollected orphans are now safely in hibernation until next year's race.

The teachers were as passionate as she was in teaching the three R's to this mobile and deprived section of society. Joan was awarded an MBE for this work. Joan joined the guiding community, running Shoreham guides, a brownie pack and then the Trefoil Guild. She loved the camaraderie, the walking adventures and the opportunities which guiding opened to young women.

Always wanting to help people, Joan assisted with lunches for senior citizens at Woodlands Church Kemsing well into her 70s, she took on the Shoreham Over 60s group, organising exciting programmes which everyone enjoyed. Throughout her life, Joan's deep love for nature, domestic animals and wildlife was a continuing theme. Dogs and cats were constant companions. In addition, she had hens, geese, ducks, peacocks, and a pig called Pearl and the occasional goat on the hill with her. A piece about Joan would not be complete without mentioning her humour and her forthright character. She loved a good bit of local news and would always bemoan the fact that living on the hill she missed out on village gossip.

She became more tolerant in her old age and would laugh that it took all sorts to make up the Shoreham community. THE NIGHT SHIFT

The UK is home to over 2,500 species of moths. They grace our skies with a diverse palette of shapes, sizes, and colours. Unlike their

butterfly relatives, most species of moth are primarily active during the night and have evolved adaptations such as sensitive antennae which guide them through the darkness, detecting subtle chemical signals that lead them to nectar and mates. The flowers of some plants open and become more fragrant in the evening, luring in the moths. These flowers also tend to have pale hues to reflect the moonlight and be easily seen by a range of nocturnal pollinators. To distinguish a moth from a butterfly, focus on the shape of the antennae - most butterflies have club-shaped antennae with a little delicate ball at the end whilst moths' are usually feathery, saw-shaped or taper to a fine point. If you find yourself too far away to admire the intricate details of their antennae, fear not! Look at their wings – most moths rest with their wings flat and outstretched in peaceful repose, whilst most butterflies fold their wings upright with elegance and grace. Often camouflaged to perfection, many moth species blend seamlessly with their environment,

The lifespan of moths varies greatly between species. Some flutter through existence for mere days while others fly the night skies for months. TALES FROM THE HILL

What a Spring it was for cowslips 'the upper class primrose.' The winter was particularly cruel as the thermometer dropped to -11c for just two nights, long enough to do away with so many of our garden plants and shrubs, but maybe the cowslips benefited from that temperature shock.

When we first moved to Rose Cottage in 1964 the land was rented to one Alfred Mersh from the Dunsany Estate. Alf scratched a living from his smallholding in East Hill and a few cows in Magpie Bottom, it was a hard life, he lived on turkey eggs and the occasional donated fruit cake.

What Alf missed in wealth was compensated by numerous relations from South London who regarded Alf as 'landed gentry.' They would descend on Alf in numbers especially on high days and holidays, camping out in the fields armed with numerous shotguns and a dozen or so ferrets to help keep the rabbit population under control. In return for a week in the country they would clear scrub and hawthorns not always in the conventional method with saws and axes, but by blowing up larger trees with the aid of a stick of dynamite.

It was on one of those visitations I observed from our kitchen window a gathering of the clan, and in particular a rather dapper gentleman, his grey flannel trousers perfectly pressed, his regimental badge glinting on his blazer breast pocket, his hair perfectly Brylcreemed and parted, he also sported the thinnest pencil line moustache. I also noticed a slight stagger in his gait, he was clutching a very large bunch of cowslips He made his uncertain way to the top the grassy bank gathering more cowslips. After a while he laid down and fell asleep. Sometime passed, he attempted to stand but he fell and started to roll down the steep bank .He arrived at the bottom still clutching his now crushed cowslips and there he spent the rest of the afternoon in quiet repose.

I never got the recipe, but cowslip wine must pack a punch!


