We looked at the books of the Bible from Genesis to Revelation, putting them into context and discovering what relevance they had to our world today.

We watched videos, we talked, we argued even - and as we did, we realised just how much, those 'Maker's instructions', can help us find answers to our questions, doubts and fears about today and, more important, the future... so it was decided to journey on together in the Autumn – learning together, talking, helping each other to make sense of the crazy, mixed up world of which we are a vital part. But this time (Covid willing) we can actually meet as home-groups.

We also agreed that what we had discovered about ourselves could be valuable to others and so we should invite anyone who'd like to join us to do so. There will be an evening group and a daytime group and our hope is that the groups will set their own agendas and what they want to study and discuss.

The bulky goods freighter has been booked for the following dates over the coming year and will call at Forge Way, Shoreham (9.15 – 9.45) and Well Hill (10.45 – 11.15): Saturday 20th November 2021 Friday 5th February 2022 Saturday 19th March 2022 Saturday 16th July 2022

The Freighter cannot accept white goods, cast iron boilers or baths, long metal poles, building materials, manure, large parts of engines or vehicles or hazardous waste. Hazardous waste now includes items like fluorescent tubes, televisions and computer monitors, batteries, oil tins and filters, paint and paint tins and chemical containers.

These items cannot be accepted on the Saturday Freighter service and must be taken to your nearest Household Waste Recycling Centre. Compostable garden waste cannot be accepted.

SHOREHAM MUSIC FESTIVAL IN SHOREHAM CHURCH FRIDAY 15 OCTOBER and 26 NOVEMBER

Our very own Music Festival is back this autumn, bringing two lovely concerts of live classical music. Both concerts will be in Shoreham's beautiful, candlelit Church at 7.30pm.

On **Friday 15 October** the Pasqualati Quartet will perform Beethoven op 18 no 6 in B major, followed by Beethoven op 135 in F major (the last of his 16 quartets). The quartet comprises Florence Cooke (violin), Max Mandel (viola), Sophia Prodanova (violin) and Christoph Richter (cello). Husband and wife Christoph and Florence formed this quartet during lockdown with friends Max and Sophia, specialising in playing all 16 of Beethoven's string quartets. Florence and Max last performed in Shoreham in 2019 and we are delighted to welcome them back.

On **Friday 26 November** the Holywell Quartet will treat us to Verdi's String Quartet, his only composition of solely instrumental music with hints of his great operatic scores, followed by Shoskatovich's String Quartet No 7 and some early Mozart. The Holywell Quartet is led by Sophie Lockett (violin), with Verity Evenson (cello), Bryony Moorcroft (viola) and Gemma Sharples (violin), Last performing in Shoreham in 2018 with a wonderfully memorable rendition of Borodin's quartet, they had been due to return in 2020, so we are thrilled that they are still able to make it in 2021.

Tickets priced at £15 for adults and £10 for students will be available at ticketsource.co.uk/shoreham-music-festival and the Village Stores. As usual, included in the ticket price is live jazz after the main concerts for the audience to enjoy, along with a cash bar.

We feel very lucky to attract such highly accomplished musicians to our little village and hope that many of you will come and enjoy what promise to be two very special evenings. On Facebook you might have heard of the plight of glow-worms. Their numbers are declining and one of the factors in this is the amount of light pollution which they experience. The Shoreham Society is, therefore, delighted to announce that the speaker for our Annual General Meeting will be Hilary Newport. She is Chair of The Countryside Charity Kent, which was formerly known as the Campaign to Protect Rural England, and she will talk on the importance, value and benefits of dark skies for humans and wildlife alike. So the date for your diaries is Friday 26th November. Not to be missed!

It would be great if we could go back to a traditional scheduled bus service for the Village again. At present there seem to be 3 options! There are the scheduled buses which do not come through the Village, but they do stop at the train station. There is the go2 service whereby you can ring up for a bus but you will need to go to a bus stop to catch it. Even with a bus pass this is not free and, I believe, would cost £2.50 for a trip to Sevenoaks. Thirdly, there is a new taxi style service, go2direct, whereby you can ring up and be picked up from your home. HISTORY NOTES 100 YEARS OF THE WAR MEMORIAL

In September 1921 the vicar, David Madge, wrote: "With the erection of the inscription stone as an adjunct to the Cross on the Hill, the Shoreham War Memorial now becomes complete." Today, the limestone monolith by the river has long been known as "the war memorial" in its own right, although when built it was clearly seen as part and parcel of the Cross – hence its famous inscription linking the two. Madge added that the stone "also serves the purpose of a village sign".

It was the collapse of plans to build a village hall in the summer of 1920 that spurred the monument's creation. Only £134 had been banked out of £3,000 needed to build a hall, which its proponents wanted to christen The Village Hall War Memorial. But Rev. Madge had stolen some of the project's thunder by starting work on the Cross, and the hall supporters were forced to throw in the towel, faced with the hall's "appalling costs". Their money was handed over to a committee headed by the vicar, which decided to spend it on an endowment fund for the Cross and the creation of a stone by the river – despite a village meeting voting in favour of a lychgate-style memorial on the Recreation Ground next to where the hall would have been.

There are signs that some of the village's religious non-conformists, who wielded much influence at the time, were less than happy about the vicar taking charge. Two declined to join Rev. Madge's planners, one arguing that such committees "should be largely composed of working men". But thanks to people like the artist Harold Copping and the lawyer Roger Gregory, a total of $\pounds 213$ was raised to design and build the stone on land donated by the owner of Water House. It was constructed by a firm from Lambeth.

Since then, many have carefully tended the monument, while others have been less respectful. In the 1950s, words like "monstrous" and "desceration" were used to describe "misuse by the public" of the memorial. The parish council vowed to do "all in its power to get this nuisance stopped" but resolved that fencing the stone off "would serve no useful purpose". The problem continued until at least 1997, when planters were placed around it and the nuisance-makers became less of a nuisance to this simple and moving tribute to fifty three of Shoreham's war dead.

I am a little concerned about the other avian characters that have moved into Magpie namely (Curan & Cordelia) two thuggish ravenous ravens that block out the sun when they fly overhead. If they ever leave the kingdom of Magpie Bottom I am not going with them, but I think they are fairly settled as they have produced a pair of very silly youngsters that I have not named-- suggestions on a postcard.

I think it is wise to dwell on wildlife we have enjoyed this year rather than what we haven't seen. After a two year gap the cuckoo sang on the 11^{th} of May and again on 2^{nd} of June. Are those two notes a song? Benjamin Britten and many other composers thought so. On the $9^{\text{th of}}$ June two nightingales serenaded us into the night and returned on the 19^{th} .

We have seen Muntjac, Red and Roe Deer, rare visitors to Magpie Bottom. Rooks the fun loving hooligans of the sky prosper thanks I believe to farmyard scavenging. Jays, magpies and woodpeckers constantly raid the bird feeders, I can't blame them but peanuts are expensive.

I have always done my best to mow around the orchids that appear on the lawn but this year they have proliferated to the extent that selective mowing is impossible so now we have what you might call a meadowy lawn.

I was hoping to find, in my volume of Gilbert White's Natural History of Selborne a lyrical and romantic observation on nightingales that I could sign off with, but all I could find was a letter he wrote to a friend saying--- "Let me hear from your own observation whether nightingales do not dust. I think they do: and if they do whether they wash also."

I can only think that nightingales were so common in those days that Gilbert found their hygiene arrangements more interesting than their song!

HEAT NETWORK FOR SHOREHAM

The Parish Council has some good news about the Heat Network initiative to replace our oil boilers with a green energy supply: our grant application was submitted on August 13th.

We have a request: Join our mailing list (greenheatingshoreham@gmail.com) to be kept informed and to contribute directly to the Feasibility Study.

A rigorous selection process identified our preferred consultants to carry out the study: Brighton and Hove Energy Services Co-operative (BHESCo) in partnership with RINA Tech UK Ltd, a large international engineering firm. BHESCo is a not-for-profit social enterprise with considerable experience of working with village communities on sustainable energy projects. Both partners are enthusiastic about working with Shoreham residents to make this project successful. Members of the Parish Council were unanimous in giving the BHESCo/RINA team their full approval.

The Parish Council then had all the information needed to submit the application for $\pounds 40,000$ in government grant funding. Huge thanks go to all of you (more than 100) who have demonstrated your support and interest in the scheme to date. In addition to individuals, we have had commitment from the Primary School, Church, Village Stores and Mount Vineyard. We are now very pleased to have the support of the West Kent Housing Association – they are well placed to contribute to the Feasibility Study as they have helpful experience in upgrading the fabric of their homes in Shoreham.

We are unlikely to hear the outcome of our application for a while yet, possibly in October or November. The study itself will take several months. <u>Input from as many</u> residents as possible will be critical. If it shows potential, a second stage study will be required with another grant (up to £100,000). We're hopeful that the UK hosting the 26th UN Climate Change Conference in the autumn will spearhead significant moves towards zero carbon and approval for innovative schemes like ours. The government has already proposed a new grant programme of £300 million to build heat networks.


